The Big Clean Up

We are so excited that you're interested in running The Big Clean Up with your school. This organized clean up event will give you the opportunity to clean up your school yard or community while bringing awareness to an important issue:

land and water quality.

Did you know, the way we treat our land is connected to our water quality?

At Water First, we understand this to be true and emphasize this in all of the work and programming that we do! The Big Clean Up is just one way you can help raise awareness about Water First and get involved with solving water issues. Thank you for your interest in supporting Water First's programs and in learning more about how you can help support access to clean water in Indigenous communities in Canada.

The length of the event and who is involved is all up to you! It can include anyone from one class to the entire school. Leading up to the big day, students will fundraise and collect donations for their participation in the clean up, and promote the event in creative ways like making posters and sharing about it on social media. The funds raised through the event will be used to support Water First's training and education programs.

Donations can be collected by signing up for a CanadaHelps fundraising page or your school can choose to collect any cash or cheque donations and mail them to the Water First offices.

The Big Clean Up Checklist

1 Plan the details

- Pick a date
- Pick a time
- Pick a location that may need a clean up

Choose how you will fundraise

- Set up an online fundraising through <u>CanadaHelps</u>. (https://waterfirst.ngo/wp-content/uploads/2021/02/CanadaHelps.pdf)
- Use <u>pledge sheets</u> to collect the information of those that donate cash or cheques and would like a tax receipt.

Create awareness for the event

- Check out our Fundraising Toolkit for lots of great resources.
- Send emails to all school staff, parents and guardians of students.
- Write up school announcements. (Examples below)
- Create posters and ads to put up in the school.
- Create posts to be shared on social media.

▲ Gather materials for the day

- Garbage bags
- Gloves
- Pickers
- Weather appropriate clothing

After the event

- After the event, send any cash or cheque donations to:

Announcements

"Did you know that 13.5% of Indigenous communities in Canada are under a boil water advisory? That means there are people who have to boil their water before it's safe to use for eating, drinking and other things. You can help change this by participating in The Big Clean Up where we will be collecting donations for Water First. They are an organization who works to address this water crisis in Indigenous communities through education and training. The clean up will be happening on [date] at [time]. We hope to see you there!"

"Good morning [insert school name], did you know that there are many complex steps in the water filtration process before we can turn on our taps? Usually the first step is debris removal, sometimes called screening and straining. This is the process of taking out large pieces of debris in the water. Yes, removing trash is step one in the water treatment process! We can help make this step easier by making sure our trash does not make it to major bodies of water. Join us at The Big Clean Up on [date] at [time] where we will be cleaning up garbage that could otherwise end up in our water bodies. We hope to see you there!"

Even the youngest students in our school know that pollution is bad. It is bad for plants and animals and yes, humans too! Help us stop pollution in our community and keep our water clean on [date] at [time] at The Big Clean Up."

- Why do you want to participate in this event?
- What does clean water mean to you?
- How do boil water advisories make you feel?
- What do you think will be most rewarding about this event?
